<u>Outreach</u>

Gifts with Vision 2017: The new United Church "Giving catalogue" arrived with the November issue of *The Observer*. There are copies available at the front and back of the sanctuary ; you can also check the website www.giftswithvision.ca to choose gifts or make donations; tax receipts will be issued. The Gifts with Vision programme has given over \$1.7 million to United Church partners making a difference in people's lives.

Example: A gift of \$50 will support Toronto's Christian Resource Centre's Clothing Room, a source of clean, basic attire and supervised job training site in Toronto's Regent Park.

- White Gift Sunday, December 10: Once again we will be donating non-perishable food items and money* to Sherbrooke Elementary School's Christmas Basket Campaign which looks after SES families in need. Please plan to bring whatever you can in next Sunday. *Make your cheque out to Plymouth-Trinity, mark it "Christmas baskets" and place it on the offering plate.
- Mitten tree: We again have an outlet for winter shoppers and idle fingers! Mental Health Estrie prepares festive HUGS packages (Hats, Underwear, Gloves, Socks/Scarves) for homeless people. The gift bags contain hats, underwear, gloves, scarves and socks in adult sizes, either hand-made or bought. Our mitten tree will be ready to receive any fruit for HUGS you can provide, between Advent and Palm Sunday.
- **Give a Perfect Gift this Christmas**: Are you looking for a gift for someone who has everything, or a gift with meaning? Consider giving a *perfect gift*, by making a donation to the United Church's Mission and Service Fund or the local food bank, Moisson Estrie, in the name of your family member or friend. Hand-made gift cards are available, in English and French, on the side table at the front of the sanctuary. We thank Janet

McBurney for her donation of time and supplies for these beautiful cards.

Moisson Estrie: The local food bank has launched Club des nouilles or Pasta Club. Members commit to donating at least \$5 per month for a year. These extra funds, will enable Moisson Estrie to stock the precious macaroni, spaghetti and other forms of pasta which are essential items, especially for low-income families. The money will also go towards other basic ingredients which are always in short supply, such as flour, sugar, oil, peanut butter and canned fruit and vegetables.

Because of generous partners, \$5/month is multiplied by 12, i.e. for each \$5, \$60 of food is distributed.

Each week the food bank assists about 300 individuals or families as well as supporting around 30 community organisations and a dozen schools.
